## INCREASE FUNDING FOR EARLY INTERVENTION (EI) BY \$60 MILLION IN FY26

### Raise provider reimbursement rates substantially this coming fiscal year

The Early Intervention (EI) program provides a range of family-centered developmental and social-emotional services to infants and toddlers who have or are at risk for significant developmental delays and disabilities. These critical services improve developmental outcomes for young children, support families to better meet their child's needs, and reduce future educational and health costs to our communities and the state by minimizing the need for special education services. **EI is an entitlement for families** and serves children from all income levels and in every county across the state.


### SERVICE DELAYS ARE HISTORICALLY HIGH AND HAVE NEARLY DOUBLED SINCE FY22

While the EI program's caseload continues to increase, the loss of EI therapists and service coordinators is having a substantial impact on the provision of timely services.

Thousands of families across the state are currently on waiting lists for the EI services they are legally entitled to receive, and the service delay percentage has nearly doubled to historically high levels.

#### THE EI WORKFORCE IS IN CRISIS



Service delays are tied directly to the program's ongoing workforce crisis. Most EI providers must cover their own health insurance and travel costs, and are not compensated for missed or canceled appointments. These challenges, among others, are leading providers to leave EI and work instead in hospitals, schools, private practices, or other settings that offer higher pay. The system has lost nearly 500 providers over the past 5 years. Recent cross-state research and cost modeling findings show that Illinois provider reimbursement rates are significantly lower than other states, and far below the true cost of delivering services.

## BABIES CANNOT WAIT - INCREASE FUNDING AND RAISE PROVIDER REIMBURSEMENT RATES

The Illinois General Assembly has an opportunity to address the Early Intervention program's stubbornly high service delays and workforce crisis. We urge the legislature to increase funding for the Early Intervention program by \$60 million in the FY26 budget, allowing IDHS to authorize a substantial rate increase for providers, and ensuring a commitment to Smart Start Illinois by including significant multi-year investments for Early Intervention. More therapists will leave the program entirely without immediate action, causing further harm to infants, toddlers, and their families. The time to act is now.
