As we reflect on Fiscal Year 2024 (FY 2024), we celebrate a year of progress and growth for Illinois' youngest children and their families. The continued momentum of Governor JB Pritzker's transformative Smart Start Illinois initiative, alongside significant legislative advancements and systemwide improvements like the creation of the new Department of Early Childhood, has further solidified our commitment to supporting expecting families, infants and toddlers. Even in the face of ongoing challenges, Raising Illinois' dedicated champions and partners can take pride in our state's collective achievements that continue to make a meaningful impact during the most formative years of a child's life-the first three.

This document outlines Raising Illinois' accomplishments for FY 2024, from July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024, across the coalition's four priority areas and eight interconnected strategies within the Illinois Prenatalto-Three Agenda. As organized in this document, work was done through budget advocacy, legislative advocacy, administrative and implementation advocacy and public awareness, engagement and mobilization. #### **Our Mission**

Together, we must address the root causes of disparities and create an equitable and cohesive early childhood development support system for expecting families, infants and toddlers and the communities in which they live. #### **Our Vision**

Every expecting family, infant and toddler in Illinois should have equitable access to affordable high-quality learning experiences, health services and economic supports that they need during their most formative years—creating the strongest foundation for their success in school and life.







#### **POLICY PRIORITY: HEALTHY PARENTS & BABIES**

### **Comprehensive Perinatal Supports**



#### **Budget**

- Appropriation of \$155M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services to increase funding for safety-net hospitals to improve inpatient outcomes in the most under-resourced communities
- Appropriation of \$4M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to develop a
  reproductive health action plan, with an emphasis on community-based and full-spectrum peripartum
  care

#### **Legislation**



- Passage of SB 3130 (Pub. Act 103-777), **establishing pregnancy as a qualifying life event** for special enrollment in a health insurance plan once the state-based exchange is operational
- Passage of the Family Recovery Plans Implementation Task Force Act (SB 3136; Pub. Act 103-941), creating
  an inter-agency task force to develop recommendations for Illinois to implement a model for serving infants
  with prenatal substance exposure that is less punitive for families
- Passage of Liam's Law (SB 3182; Pub. Act 103-948), requiring hospitals to notify the gestational parent of a stillborn fetus of the parent's right to receive a certificate of birth resulting in stillbirth
- Passage of HB 5142 (Pub. Act 103-720), requiring commercial health insurance to cover services for pregnancy, postpartum and newborn care provided by doulas, midwives and lactation consultants, as well as related medical supplies, starting in 2026
- Passage of HB 5493 (Pub. Act 103-718), **prohibiting prior authorization** by health insurers for **obstetric or gynecologic care**

#### **Administration and Implementation**



- Expansion of Family Connects Chicago, a Universal Newborn Support Services (UNSS) model, to 10 birthing hospitals in the City of Chicago, reaching over 7,800 families
- Continued implementation of Family Connects in Peoria and Stephenson counties, reaching nearly
   2,250 families combined
- Ongoing implementation of **Medicaid coverage for doula services and lactation support services**, as directed under the Improving Health Care for Pregnant and Postpartum Individuals Act (SB 967; Pub. Act 102-665)
- Development of recommendations to the Early Learning Council for cross-system standards for doula services as an enhancement to existing state-funded home visiting services
- Advancement of key strategies within the Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Action Plan, administered by IDPH

#### Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization



- Engagement of over **400 parents, providers and other advocates across two public all-Coalition events** highlighting the maternal care experiences of birthing people and their providers
- Continued operation of The Gathering, a campaign developed by EverThrive Illinois to address maternal
  morbidity and mortality in the City of Chicago, reaching more than 20,000 Black birthing people and their
  families
- Socialization of key findings from the third release of the Illinois Maternal Morbidity and Mortality Report, published by IDPH

### POLICY PRIORITY: HEALTHY PARENTS & BABIES

## Strengthened Home Visiting System



#### **Budget**

- Appropriation of an 11.1% increase (\$75M) in FY 2025 for the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to
  expand the Early Childhood Block Grant, with at least 25% of new funding set aside for Prevention Initiative
  prenatal-to-age-three programs, including home visiting
- Appropriation of a 21.8% increase (\$5M) in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to expand the Healthy Families Illinois and Maternal Child Home Visiting programs, stabilizing the workforce and increasing access for families



#### <u>**Administration and Implementation**</u>

- Administration of \$22.9M in general revenue funds for IDHS
   Healthy Families Illinois and Maternal Child Home Visiting
   programs, serving over 5,500 parents and children
   combined
- Federal award of nearly \$12M for the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program in Illinois, serving nearly 2,400 parents and children
- Grants totaling \$2.7M (10% increase) for ISBE Prevention
   Initiative Home Visiting programs, serving an estimated
   428 additional infants and toddlers
- Inclusion of Infant/Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation in the IDHS Home Visiting Expansion Notice of Funding Opportunity for FY 2025
- Ongoing coordination to align home visiting program requirements, standards and salary floors across funding streams



#### **Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization**

- Administration and analysis of the Gateways Staffing and Salary Survey and MIECHV Survey to inform workforce recommendations
- Publication of findings from the Illinois Home Visiting Caregiver and Provider Feedback Project, led by Start Early, with recommendations for strengthening supports for caregivers and providers







#### **POLICY PRIORITY: HIGH-QUALITY EARLY LEARNING**

# Accessible Family- and Center-based Care & Learning



#### **Budget**

- Appropriation of \$122M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to administer the Smart Start Workforce Compensation Grants, Smart Start Quality Support Program and the Early Childhood Apprentice Program
- Appropriation of an 11.1% increase (\$75M) in FY 2025 for the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to expand the Early Childhood Block Grant (ECBG), with at least 25% of new funding set aside for Prevention Initiative prenatal-to-age-three programs, including center-based early care and learning
- Appropriation of a 6.3% increase (\$36.5M) in FY 2025 for IDHS to accommodate the growing subsidy caseloads of the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)



#### **Legislation**

- Passage of SB 2675 (Pub. Act 103-759), **expanding eligibility for the Early Childhood Construction Grants** to not-for-profit entities that rent or lease from another not-for-profit entity
- Passage of HB 4491 (Pub. Act 103-821), improving operational flexibility for early care and learning
  programs by allowing certain experienced teachers to open or close a facility on a given day, instead of the
  director



#### <u>Administration and Implementation</u>

- Grants totaling \$9.4M (114% increase) for ISBE Prevention Initiative Center-Based programs, serving an estimated 720 additional infants and toddlers
- Inclusion of an increased award amount for infant-toddler classrooms in both the Smart Start Transition
   Grants for FY 2024 and the Smart Start Workforce Grants for FY 2025
- Submission of recommendations for the Illinois Child Care and Development Fund Plan Federal Fiscal Years 2025–2027 to include strategies for stabilizing and improving the supply and quality of early care and learning for infants and toddlers



#### <u>Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization</u>

- Engagement of over 250 home- and center-based early care and learning providers in a series of listening sessions and focus groups about both the IDHS Smart Start Workforce Compensation Grants and the ISBE ECBG
- Mobilization of more than 10 parents and providers to testify at a public hearing in favor of increased ECBG funding in the FY 2025 budget, with comments focused specifically on Prevention Initiative prenatal-to-agethree programs





## POLICY PRIORITY: HIGH-QUALITY EARLY LEARNING Optimized Early Intervention Services



#### **Budget**

 Appropriation of an 3.8% increase (\$6M) in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Human Services' Early Intervention (EI) program to accommodate growing caseloads for El service delivery



#### <u>Administration and Implementation</u>

- Federal grants to 7 community health centers in Illinois totaling \$1.4M through the Early Childhood
   Development Award, for the purpose of increasing developmental screenings and referrals for appropriate services, including El
- Disbursement of **one-time incentive payments** to El service coordinators and providers, funded with expiring pandemic relief dollars, to encourage **workforce retention**
- Proposed expansion of the income threshold for families to receive
   El services at no cost, from 185% to 318% of the Federal Poverty Level, and
   consideration of recommendations to continue waiving all family fees
   or only issue fees when families receive all entitled services
- Ongoing implementation of strategies to address existing disparities in El access for underserved populations and make other system improvements, including multi-state research, cost modeling, modified service delivery pilots and the NICU-to-Home service delivery model



#### **Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization**

 Collection of over 650 letters to lawmakers from parents, providers and other advocates in support of increased El funding

 Engagement of families and providers through a series of town halls and "know your rights" workshops to improve public awareness of families' procedural rights, including the right to file a state complaint if there has been a violation of El timelines

 Publication of 15 media stories across the state highlighting the impact of El service delays on children and families







## POLICY PRIORITY: FINANCIALLY SECURE FAMILIES Family-friendly Work Policies



#### **Legislation**

- Passage of HB 2161 (Pub. Act 103-797), prohibiting employers from refusing to hire, refusing to promote, firing, disciplining, harassing or retaliating against an employee based on actual or perceived family responsibilities
- Municipal passage of the Chicago Paid Leave and Paid Sick and Safe Leave Ordinance, increasing
  the minimum amount of paid time off that most workers in Chicago can earn per year to up to 40
  hours of paid time off and up to 40 hours of paid sick and safe time off, effective FY 2025



#### **Administration and Implementation**

- Implementation of the **Paid Leave for All Workers Act** (SB 208; Pub. Act 102-1143), effective January 1, 2024, with final rules published on April 30, 2024, entitling most workers in Illinois, outside of Cook County and the City of Chicago, to earn a minimum of up to 40 hours of paid time off per year
- Publication of the final rule on Initial Activity Search for Child Care Assistance Program eligibility,
  permitting up to three months of subsidized early care and learning while the parent or other relative
  is looking for employment or education, although this policy is subject to appropriation



#### **Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization**

• Launch of "know your rights" toolkits, developed by Women Employed, for the new paid leave laws both in the City of Chicago and at the state level







## Income Supports for Families



#### **Budget**

- Appropriation of \$50M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department
  of Revenue to implement the new state-level Child Tax Credit for
  nearly 400,000 families who are eligible for the Earned Income Tax
  Credit and have children under age 12
- Appropriation of \$10M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services to implement the new Medical Debt Relief Pilot Program, which will forgive the medical debt of over 300,000 eligible Illinoisans
- Appropriation of \$1M in FY 2025 for the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to implement the Diaper Distribution Pilot Program, which will provide a diaper allowance to eligible families in two pilot communities



#### **Legislation**

- Passage of HB 4951 (Pub. Act 103-592), the FY 2025 state revenue package, including the creation of a new state-level child tax credit for eligible families with at least one child under age 12 to receive a 20% increase to the value of their Earned Income Tax Credit in tax year 2024, and a 40% increase in subsequent tax years
- Passage of the **Medical Debt Relief Act** (HB 5290; Pub. Act 103-647), establishing a pilot program to acquire and discharge the medical debt of eligible low- and middle-income Illinois residents



#### <u>Administration and Implementation</u>

- Publication of the final rule making permanent the increased cash-value voucher/benefit and food package flexibility through the federal Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)
- Creation of a multi-year collaboration between IDHS and the Illinois Head Start Association to increase WIC coverage by coordinating referrals to WIC for families enrolled in Head Start and Early Head Start programs
- Creation of an advisory group to launch the Chicago Empowerment Fund, a new guaranteed income
  program in the City of Chicago based on the Chicago Resilient Communities Pilot, which will distribute \$500
  per month for twelve months to eligible individuals



#### <u>Public Awareness, Engagement and Mobilization</u>

 Ongoing development of both statewide and local outreach and mobile enrollment campaigns for WIC, led by the Greater Chicago Food Depository, to improve awareness, challenge misperceptions and drive participation in WIC, with a planned launch in FY 2025







#### **POLICY PRIORITY: STRONG INFRASTRUCTURE**

# Cross-system Preparation, Professional Development & Support



#### **Budget**

- Appropriation of \$5.25M in FY 2025 to the Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC) to implement the Human Services Professional Loan Repayment Program for the first time since its authorization in 2022
- Appropriation of \$5M in FY 2025 to ISAC to operate the Early Childhood Access Consortium for Equity (ECACE) scholarship program, partially replacing expiring federal funds
- Appropriation of \$2M in FY 2025 to the Illinois Department of Public Health to continue mental health trainings for the frontline pediatric workforce



#### **Legislation**

Passage of the FY 2025 Budget Implementation Act (HB 4959; Pub. Act 103-588), which, among other
provisions, makes permanent the ECACE scholarship program



#### **Administration and Implementation**

- Continued growth of the statewide registry of Infant/Early Childhood Mental Health (I/ECMH) consultants, with 189 consultants (31.25% increase over FY 2023) across all 102 counties
- Continued administration of the ECACE scholarship program, awarding roughly \$78M in FY 2024, reaching 4,700 students
- Ongoing trainings for clinicians to use DC:0-5, an age-appropriate mental health diagnostic tool, as required by Pub. Act 101-654, reaching nearly 500 professionals



#### **Public Awareness and Engagement**

 Release of an equity analysis of I/ECMH Consultation in Illinois, coupled with a series of presentations led by the Erikson Institute to inform advocates of the report's key findings

#### POLICY PRIORITY: STRONG INFRASTRUCTURE

### **Strong State & Community Structures**



#### **Budget**

Appropriation of \$14.2M in FY 2025 to establish the Illinois Department of Early Childhood, a new unified
agency that will administer the state's early childhood education and care services beginning in FY 2027



#### **Legislation**

 Passage of the Department of Early Childhood Act (SB 1; Pub. Act 103-594), authorizing the creation of a new state agency that will simplify and improve the administration of programs currently operated by three separate agencies



#### **Administration and Implementation**

 Application for the federal Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five Renewal Grant, under which Illinois, if selected, could receive up to \$27M over three years to strengthen coordination, quality and outcomes of prenatal-to-age-three and early childhood services
